




Work To Be Proud Of... Year 6

Year 6 have been learning about World War 2 in History. Here are some creative pieces, including the garden which represents the 'Dig For Victory!'



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

Curiosity is one of the core values at Runnymede College and the Year 5 trip to the Museo Nacional de Ciencia y Tecnología (MUNCYT) certainly captured the children's curiosity and led them on a fascinating journey through the scientific method, from hypothesis to drawing conclusions. Hands-on scientific investigations involved irreversible chemical changes to materials. These chemical changes produced new materials, a solid foam 'head' and a crystal forest, which the children could then take home with them. What's more, the children then investigated the property of density of different liquids and solids, creating a tower of materials of different densities. This workshop enriched the children's learning in their science topic, 'Properties and Changes in Materials', as well as took their learning beyond the four walls of the classroom, showing them what the community has to offer in enriching their learning beyond the school gate.

PSHE

PSHE gives us an opportunity to deliver a programme of learning through which the children in the Prep School acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to manage their lives. PSHE is taught under the umbrella of three main strands: Identity, which we are following at the moment; Kindness, in the Spring Term and finally, Curiosity, which is taught in the Summer Term. Students were asked to write their opinion on the following question on Identity.

Exercise one: identity. A new ship – let's call her the Athena – sets sail on a round-the world trip, waved off by a huge crowd. Year 4 were tasked with designing a Community Centre with an emphasis on inclusivity. Many focused on rooms with a multi-purpose theme, some included the needs of disabled people whilst others considered including a well-being sanctuary with outdoor space. All were asked to take into account different needs and identities of the community.

Year 5 tackled the difficult subject of 'Conflict' followed by a lesson on 'Mediation'. These lessons are designed to give children strategies to work through and resolve arguments and disagreements.

Year 6 researched some of the UN Conventions for the Rights of Children. The focus was on democracy and how to treat people fairly. Additionally, we also examined listening to different point of view regarding a democratic society using some philosophy games. (P4C - Philosophy for Children).

Year 7 spent three weeks looking at Cyber Security focusing on potential problems with social media accounts and how to stay safe on the internet. The aim of these lessons is primarily safety online; however, we covered multiple examples of how mistakes can be made by clicking a hyperlink, spending money online and surfing the internet using public Wi-Fi.




Identity Competition




Learning!
