Farewell to Jo Barr —

I came to Runnymede College in 2003 and I immediately felt at home through the kindness of so many people who welcomed me to the school. At that top of that list, I have to put Jo Barr's name whose sense of humour matched mine in so many ways. Later, I was also able to see at first hand her style of leadership as Head of the Junior School. Her door was always open: many tears were shed but also many problems made lighter through her compassion and advice. Jo Barr, like myself, was educated by teachers who had grown up and come of age during economic depression of the 1930s and the conflict that characterised the 1940s. As a result of these experiences, many of these teachers wanted our generation to fully experience freedom and independence in our journey to adulthood.



Jo Barr brought these principles with her to Runnymede College both as a class teacher and head teacher. Education, she insisted, should sometimes just be fun. As the years passed, we spoke more about our families. Her loyalty to her family is unconditional. As a parent, and now as a grandparent, she has made as lasting an impression on her own children as she has on the many, many children who have passed through her classrooms and as Head Teacher of the Runnymede College Junior School and Pre-prep

Literacy Week

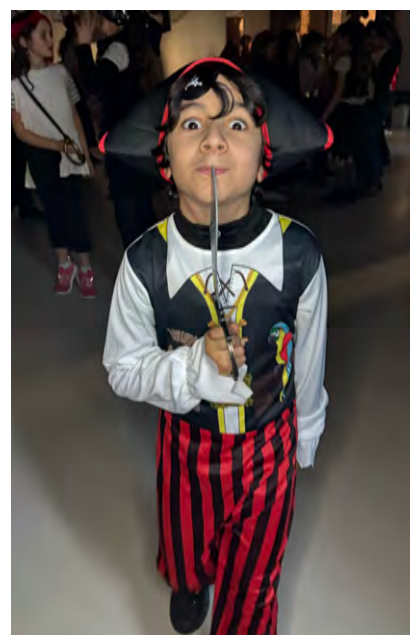
Pirates of the Disco Sea Party

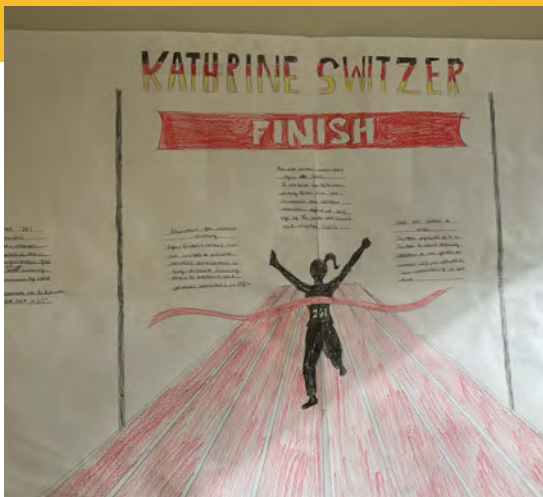
History Club

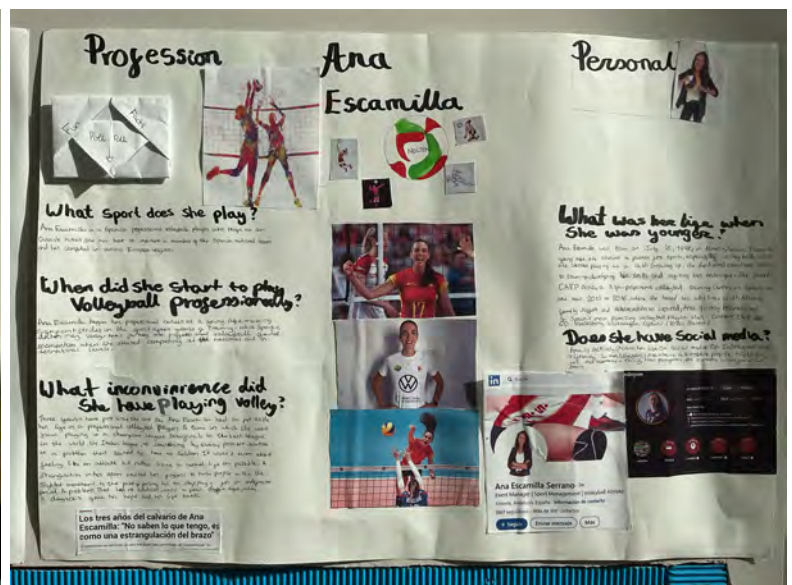
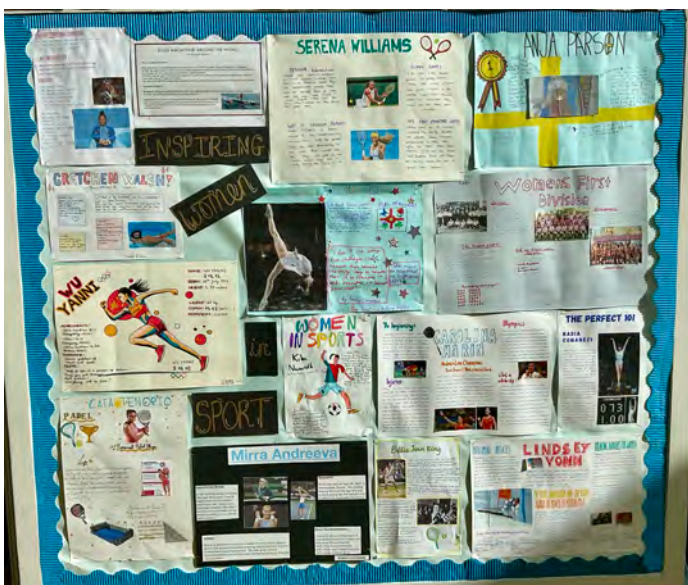


International Women's Day
